Spy job merits top ranking among fifth graders

Students in Mr. Paul Bailey's ninth grade Careers English class recently conducted an opinion poll among the Midway School District's 273 fifth graders.

Of the 24 possible careers recommended to the fifth grade class, spy/agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation or Central Intelligence Agency ranked first with 16 percent of the students selecting that

occupation.

The second favorite career was veterinarian with 13 percent followed by professional athlete at 12 percent. A total of 10 percent of the students polled said they would like to be a movie star.

Among the fifth graders, 8 percent want to follow a video game designer path of employment and 6 percent opted to go into the medical

field. A total 65 percent were spread out among the other 18 possible career options.

"We do the polling unit of study each year, and it's always the most popular," said Bailey.

This year's results were quite different from past years. "We almost always have the majority of the fifth graders wanting to go into the medicine field," Bailey said.
