Because a successful business career inevitably involves effective interaction with a variety of people, Anthropology would be useful to any student in the Business School. Students who anticipate working in international business should find a concentration in Anthropology particularly helpful. Recommended are courses in language and culture and area courses such as Peoples of Africa, Peoples of South America, Peoples of Japan and Korea, and topical courses such as Economic Anthropology and Applied Cultural Anthropology. Anthropology courses in archeology such as North American Archeology, Ancient American Civilizations, and Museum Anthropology would be relevant to business careers which involve tourism or museum administration. Those who are considering hospital administration or other jobs connected with the biomedical sciences would find anthropology courses such as Introduction to Medical Anthropology and Controversies on the Living and the Dead useful to their goals. The Anthropology Department faculty advisor for Business School students is Professor Felix Moos. Students selecting this concentration should consult with him.

Requirements:

Five (5) Jr./Sr. level courses in Anthropology, at least 3 of which are numbered 313 or above.
