From the Associate Vice Provosts What IP Does

New programs, increased numbers of international students studying at KU, growing numbers of GAP participants, and increased professional activities of all sorts among staff members were again part of the picture at International Programs these past twelve months. Yet another award for programming excellence—a National Association of Student Personnel Administrators’ award to the GAP program for “Best Practices in International Programming”—has encouraged us all in our efforts, many of which are summarized in this report.

Among the many significant pieces of good news concerning external support for International Programs at KU were the several large gifts IP received this year for: an International House, study abroad scholarships, and a named teaching award. You will find details in the report. Thank you to these donors and to all those who supported International Programs through donations, time, and words of encouragement.

It was also a year of transition in IP. The successes of this year occurred on the watch of Dean Diana Carlin, who stepped down July 1 to take up a position as Dean in Residence at the Council of Graduate Studies in Washington, D.C. We will miss the energy, expertise, and commitment Dean Carlin brought to her position for seven years. IP has seen remarkable growth in that time; all of us who work at the University or support its programs owe Dean Carlin considerable gratitude for her tireless work to help bring the world to KU and KU to the world.

As part of the transition, the Graduate School and International Programs became separate entities on July 1, with the Graduate School becoming Graduate Studies in the KU Center for Research. International Programs is now a free-standing unit with three integrally connected constituent units (Applied English Center, International Student and Scholar Services, and Office of Study Abroad). Its place in the organization of the university administration has also changed, as reflected in our new titles. We all look forward to continuing good work in the efforts to internationalize the KU campus in all its dimensions. We appreciate the support of everyone on and off campus who has worked with International Programs to realize the goal of the university to help all of us—students, staff, faculty, administrators, and members of the local, regional, and worldwide communities—to flourish in a global society.

International Programs (IP) is a conduit and catalyst for the university’s international programs and activities. IP works with a variety of university and external constituencies to:

- promote international studies and study abroad as integral parts of the curriculum of every unit;
- coordinate the Fulbright Program, Graduate Direct Exchanges, and other opportunities for graduate and faculty research and study abroad;
- develop initiatives to internationalize the curriculum; promote international programming and cultural events at the university;
- prepare non-native English-speaking international students, scholars, and visitors for participation in U.S. classrooms;
- arrange internationally related workshops, symposia, and translation and related services to meet the needs of the business community, teachers at all levels, and the general public in the Midwest;
- assist in obtaining public and private financial assistance for international studies and programs;
- cooperate with other educational institutions to promote interdisciplinary programs in international studies;
- develop closer relationships between the university and its alumni abroad;
- act as liaison between scholars and sponsored students and university departments and offices; provide immigration advising for visiting international scholars;
- assist area high school, college, and university students in exploring international careers; and
- recruit in targeted areas to increase the number of applications, both undergraduate and graduate, by qualified international students.

An International Campus

Alumni Fund New International House

The University of Kansas will have a residence for international visiting scholars, thanks to a \$250,000 gift from Tom and Jann Rudkin to renovate a historic two-story house at 704 W. 12th St. KU Endowment acquired the property in 2001 from the Frank Pinet family.

The gift for the home for international scholars includes funds to maintain the property and cover operating expenses during its first year of use. Work on the house, which began this summer, is expected to take two to three months. International House will open in January.

Global Awareness Program

GAP Receives National Award

The Global Awareness Program (GAP) received the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators' award for Best Practices in International Programming. GAP was recognized as a campus-based initiative that promotes international awareness.

GAP Coordinator Jane Irungu received the award on behalf of the university at the ACPA: College Student Educators International & NASPA: Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education's joint meeting at the twelfth annual NASPA International Symposium on April 1 in Orlando, FL.

GAP Students Visit Washington, D.C.

Ten undergraduates went to Washington, D.C., March 18 – 21 with Diana Carlin, former dean of the Graduate School & International Programs, and Jane Irungu to meet policy makers and learn about international organizations.

The ten students, who all are GAP participants, applied for the

spring break trip and were selected by a group of faculty. The goal of the trip was to expose students to a variety of organizations that work internationally so they have a clear understanding of what career international opportunities are available to them and what is needed to prepare for an international career.

GAP Certification Numbers Continue to Rise

Students from 20 disciplines completed the Global Awareness Program this spring. They were recognized in a ceremony May 10.

The 150 undergraduates received GAP certification on their transcripts to inform future employers that they have completed a course of study at KU that fosters international understanding. A total of 232 students completed GAP this academic year.

GAP recognizes students for studying abroad; taking courses with an international focus, including foreign languages; and being significantly involved in international cocurricular activities. All undergraduates are eligible to participate.

Study Abroad Scholarships Established

Donald Faught of Naples, Fla., and Red Feathers Lakes, Col., pledged \$30,000 to KU Endowment for the Donald Faught Study Abroad Scholarship for engineering students at the University of Kansas.

Faught graduated from KU in 1973 with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering. He retired from DuPont in 2005 as a vice president responsible for several global business units. He spent his entire career with DuPont in a variety of technical, manufacturing, marketing, and business management positions. Faught worked for 10 years in Geneva, Switzerland.

KU alumnus Larry D. Horner, who graduated with a business degree in 1956, and his wife, Donna Manning Horner, of San Jose del Cabo, Mexico, established a \$500,000 scholarship fund for study abroad participants.

The Horner Study Abroad Scholarship Fund will provide scholarships based on academic merit and financial need. The scholarships, which may be awarded to undergraduate or graduate students, will be open to students studying in any academic discipline at KU. Initially, there will be an emphasis on scholarships in the School of Business.

Visiting Scholars

Junior Faculty Development Program Orientation

At the request of the State Department, International Programs coordinated the four-day Junior Faculty Development Program (JFDP) orientation. The orientation helped 66 junior faculty members from the Balkans and former Soviet republics acclimate to the United States and the American

higher education system before they went to their host institutions for the semester. Five fellows stayed at KU. Orientation activities include presentations about intercultural conflict, higher education, and American society. Participants experienced an evening of bowling and a square dance (pictured above).

Groundwater issues Program

IP helped host six groundwater experts from South Asia for three weeks in December to share information about water issues.

The International Water Management Institute sponsored the program, which was designed to expose the Asian participants to groundwater issues and management challenges in the U.S. and to introduce the Kansas participants to Asian water management issues. Law Professor John Peck coordinated the group in Kansas, and Diana Carlin, former dean of the Graduate School & International Programs, was the co-director.

Their schedule included presentations by staff members of the Kansas Geological Survey about Kansas groundwater issues, talks by the visitors about conditions in their countries, visits with faculty at Washburn University and the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and meetings with officials at the Kansas Division of Water Resources and at other Kansas water agencies.

Woodyard Award Established

George and Eleanor Woodyard donated \$25,000 to the Office of International Programs to endow the George and Eleanor Woodyard International Educator Award. The award will recognize a faculty member for outstanding contributions to internationalization efforts at the university. Beginning in 2007, the endowed fund provides a cash award of \$1,000 to the recipient.

Provost's Award for Leadership

School of Law Professor John Head received the 2006 Provost's Award for Leadership in International Education at the University Convocation in September.

Head was recognized for his active commitment to international education. He has been involved with student exchange programs in Turkey, Ireland, and England. Head was the first law faculty member to mentor a Junior Faculty Development Program fellow. He has participated in faculty exchanges between KU and the University of Vienna and the University of Hong Kong. He has also helped with several legal education projects in Indonesia, resulting in the publication of two books used by law schools throughout that country.

People Speak Forum

Former Ambassador to Qatar, Kenton Keith, spoke at the 2006 People Speak event at the Dole Institute of Politics. Keith, senior vice president of Meridian International in Washington, D.C., and a KU Distinguished Service Citation award recipient, talked about "American Grass Roots Diplomacy in an Anti-American World."

Enrollment Trends

After increasing by nearly 60% in 2005-2006, growth in enrollment in the AEC's regular class program continued at a more moderate pace in 2006-2007 with about 12% more students. The numbers of government- and industry-sponsored students from the Middle East continued to grow. Enrollment in the AEC's spe-

cial programs was down slightly, while Graduate Student Support Program enrollment grew by 27%.

Special Programs

Long-term special programs during the fall and spring semester continued their successful record. For the eighth year, the AEC ran a ten-week program for a group of French undergraduates majoring in international business at ACI-Négoçia in Paris and Montluçon, France. This was the largest enrollment ever for the ACI group. The students' English language skills were tested upon their return to ACI, and the results were rated excellent. The AEC celebrated the seventeenth year of its English language and American culture program for Kanagawa University undergraduates under the leadership of a new AEC program director, Mark Algren. Eighteen students from Kanagawa University in Lawrence's sister city of Hiratsuka, Japan, spent four weeks at the AEC in February in the AEC's longest running special program. Highlights of the program were the overnight homestay with American families, attending a Jayhawks basketball game, and enjoying Valentine's Day at Pinckney Elementary School. As the Kanagawa students were departing for Japan, 10 students from the Economics Department of Meikai University, Tokyo, Japan, arrived on campus to participate in the fourth year of a language and culture program, which was organized by Dr. Joji Asahi, an alum of KU and the current vice-president of Meikai University. The Meikai program was also administered by a new AEC program director, Sandra Tompson.

Graduate Support Program

The Graduate Support Program (GSP)—a combination of graduate school courses, workshops for students and faculty, counseling, and support groups—continues to see steadily increasing enrollments with enrollments increasing from 81 in 2005-2006 to 103 in 2006-2007. Enrollments in the thesis and dissertation

tutorials more than doubled during this period. For the first time, some of the funding for the GSP comes from external sources. A PREP grant (KU Post Baccalaureate Research Education Program), which supports students from minority cultures in a program designed to prepare them for careers in biomedical fields, enrolls the participants in the Professional Writing course and supports the salary of the course instructor. In addition, one department on campus is now requiring all incoming PhD students to enroll in Professional Writing their first semester on campus. The students who enroll in the courses are approximately half native speakers and half non-native with a significant number of first-generation university students among the enrollees.



Applied English Center students and staff traveled to Arkansas' Buffalo River for a weekend of canoeing in early July. The trip also included a visit to Missouri's Fantastic Caverns.

Staff Activities

Chuck Seibel continued to serve as Central Office Coordinator of University and College Intensive English Programs (UCIEP). At the NAFSA Conference in Minneapolis, he organized a UCIEP breakfast reception for overseas advisors from around the world and the UCIEP information booth.

Margaret Coffey, associate director, was invited to be a guest speaker at the Orientation Program for the 2007 JFDP visiting scholars to the US, hosted by KU's Office of International Programs; her presentation was on "Understanding Conversational Styles around the Globe." She also gave a presentation, "Promoting Diversity in ESL American Culture Curricula," at the NAFSA Region II Conference.

Mary McGuinness, associate director, and Mark Algren, language specialist, joined Hodgje Bricke and Charlie Bankart from International Programs on a visit to Washington, D.C., where they visited 10 sponsoring agencies and embassies.

Mark Algren, language specialist, was an invited panelist (The Saudi Effect on Intensive English Programs) at the annual convention of Colorado Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). He also attended a workshop in Alexandria, Virginia, as self-study coordinator for AEC re-accreditation by the Commission for English Program Accreditation (CEA). Mark was involved in a number of TESOL 2007 sessions: He was one of the organizers of a "Spotlight Session," "Tides of Change in the Arabian Gulf," which featured presenters from six Gulf countries; he was a copresenter for a workshop, "Tips for Writing TESOL Convention Session Proposals," and three presentations: "So... You Wanna be a Conference Chair, huh?" "Constructive Dialogs with Gulf Arab Students," and "Helping Gulf Arab Students Succeed in IEPs." In April, he went on IRAC-funded recruiting trips to Turkey with Russ Ostermann from the School of Engineering in April and to China with Daphne Johnston from ISSS in July.

Christine Jensen, language specialist, gave a presentation "The Least We Owe International Graduate Students" at the NAFSA Region II Conference and with former Dean Diana Carlin and Charlie Bankhart at the national NAFSA Annual Conference in Minneapolis.

Suzanne Achleitner, lecturer, and Patrick Murphy, GTA, presented "Creating Online ESL Courses" at the NAFSA Region II Conference in Kansas City. Twelve AEC faculty and staff attended the conference.

Geri Lamer, special program associate, presented on the AEC's Community Learning course at the NAFSA Annual Conference and Expo in Minneapolis. Six other AEC staff members attended the conference.

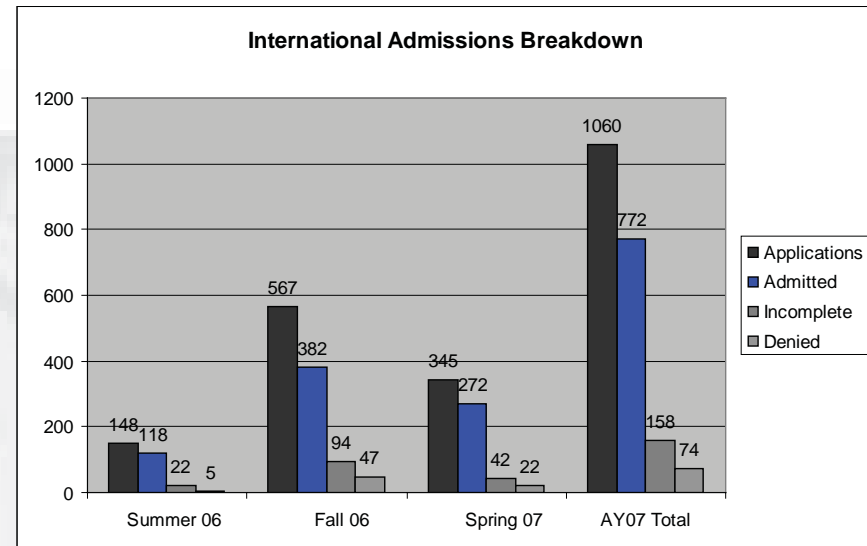
The AEC was represented by sixteen faculty and staff members at TESOL 2007 in Seattle.

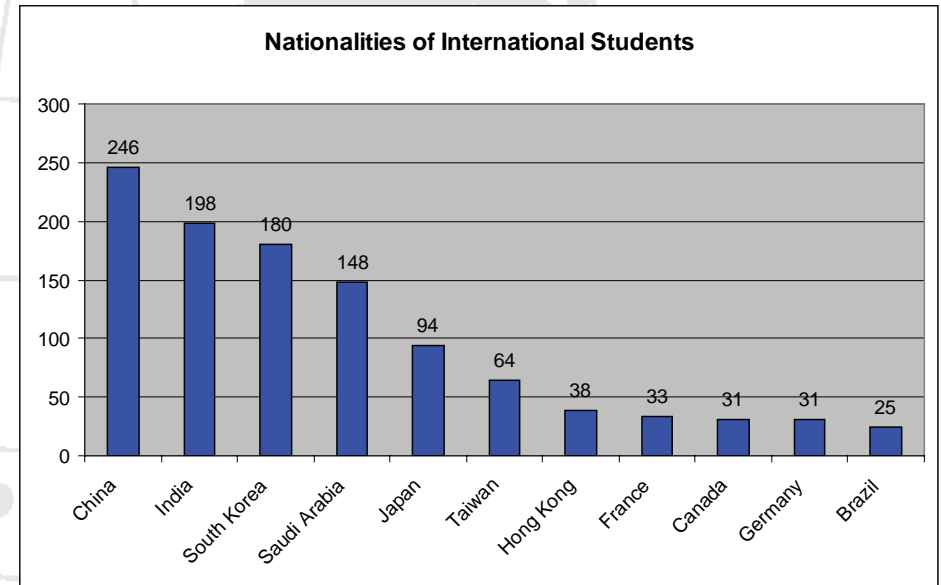

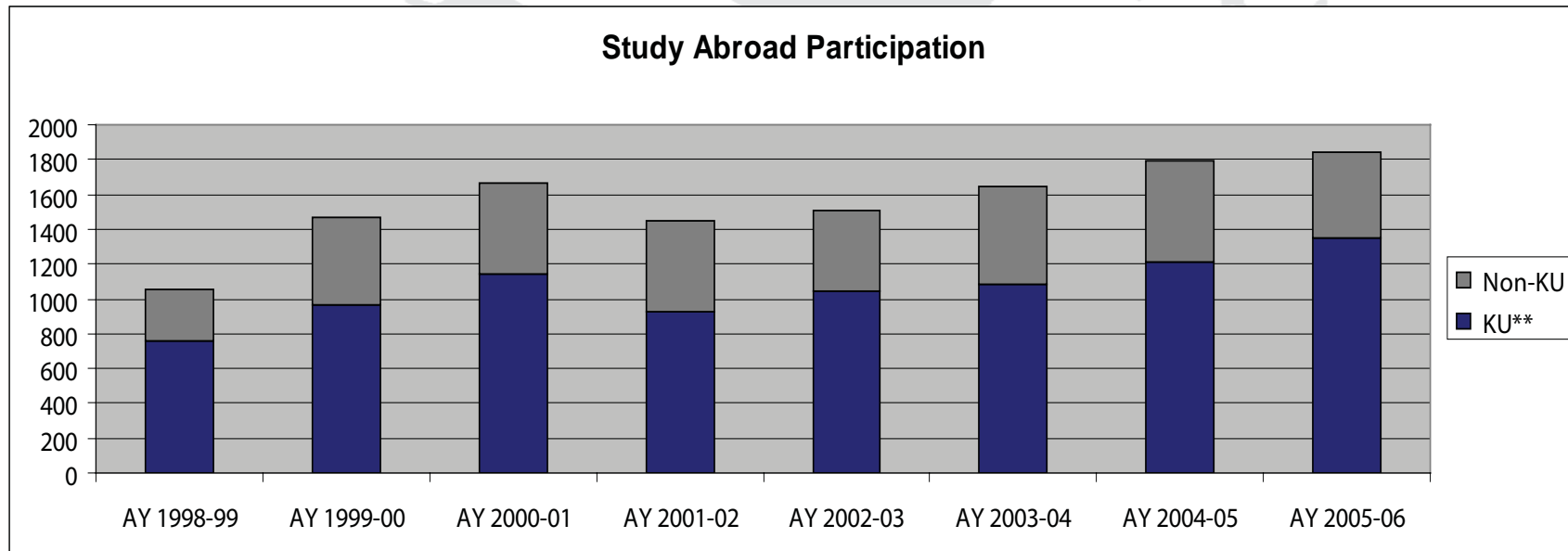

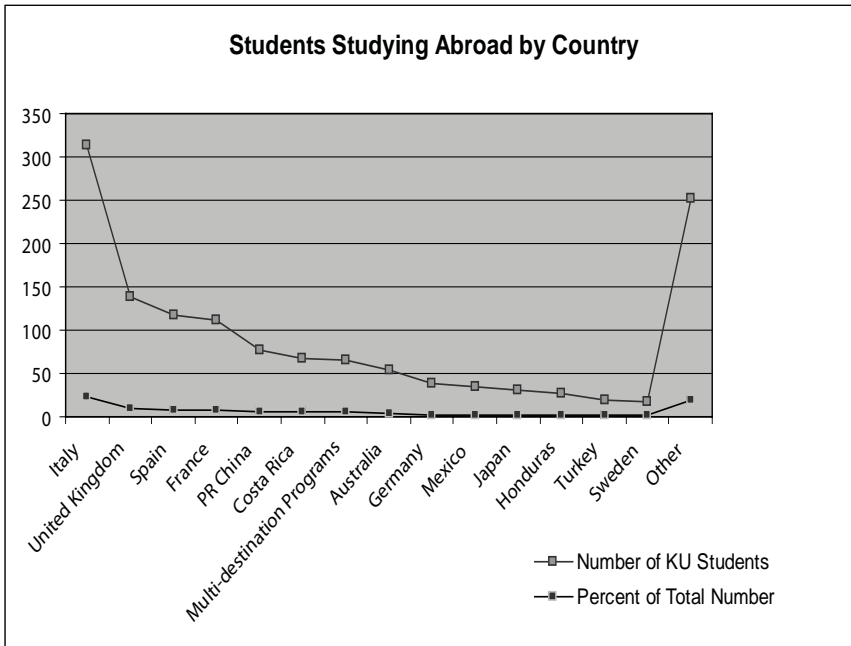

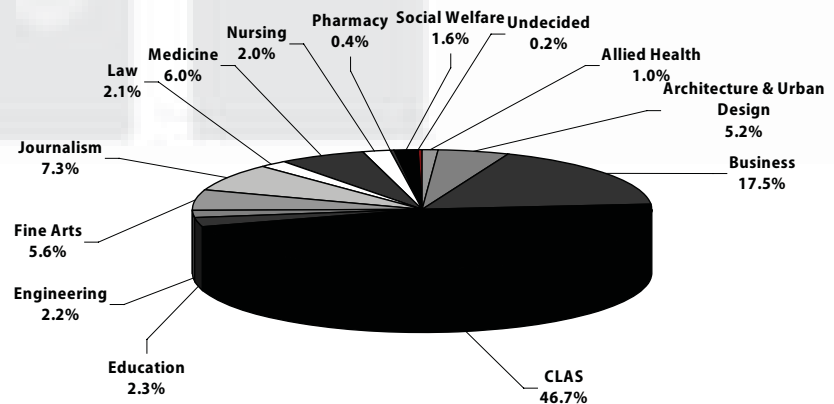
