From the Dean

As the 2002-03 annual report indicates, it was another very busy year for the Office of International Programs. Our outreach activities with international alumni and our expat community around the world are growing. Through our alumni network we have raised funds for both graduate and undergraduate study abroad scholarships and special projects on campus, developed networks for students who want internships abroad, and formed new relationships with premiere international universities. Our activities on campus and contacts throughout the country with alumni have also kept us busy and have reaped many of the same types of rewards.



We reacted to all of the international activity throughout the world by hosting educational forums throughout the year that benefit the campus and Lawrence communities. Through the efforts of two ad hoc committees—one on study abroad and one on the undergraduate international experience—we are developing better ways to inform students of study abroad activities, creating better programs, and finding ways to internationalize students who cannot study abroad.

We have supported faculty travel and research and have supported other international units to host conferences and programs. In other words, we continue to innovate and believe that we are fulfilling our mission as the umbrella organization for international activity on the KU campus.

What OIP Does

The Office of International Programs (OIP) is a conduit and catalyst for the university's international programs and activities. OIP works with a wide variety of university and external constituencies to:

- promote international studies and study abroad as an integral part of the curriculum of every unit;
- coordinate the Fulbright Program, Graduate Direct Exchanges, and other opportunities for graduate and faculty research and study abroad;
- assist faculty members from all disciplines to pursue international research projects, travel, and collaborative work;
- develop initiatives to internationalize the curriculum; promote international programming and cultural events at the university;
- prepare non-native English-speaking international students, scholars, and visitors for participation in U.S. classrooms;
- arrange internationally-related workshops, symposia, and translation and related services to fulfill the needs of the business community, teachers at all levels, and the general public in the Midwest;
- assist in obtaining public and private financial assistance for international studies and programs;
- cooperate with other educational institutions to promote interdisciplinary programs in international studies;
- develop closer relationships between the university and its alumni abroad;
- act as liaison between scholars and sponsored students and university departments and offices; provide immigration advising for visiting international scholars;
- assist area high school, college, and university students in exploring international careers; and
- recruit in targeted areas to increase the number of applications, both undergraduate and graduate, by qualified international students.

An International Campus

The Global Proficiency Certification Program

Provost Shulenburger has called for all undergraduates to have an opportunity for an international experience before graduating from KU. The Global Proficiency Certification Program (GPCP) was unanimously approved by the Ad Hoc Committee on Global Proficiency Certification in May and presented to the Provost and Deans. It is awaiting endorsement from faculty governance. The program consists of three components: International Experience, Academic Coursework, and Co-Curricular International Activities. In order to be certified, a student must complete two out of three components.

Visitors to OIP

Thomas Brady, Central Asia specialist and aide to U.S. Senator Sam Brownback, spoke on the geopolitical significance of Central Asia in November.

Deborah Netland, Program Manager, Office of Humanitarian Demining Programs, Bureau of Political-Military Affairs U.S. Department of State, addressed the Navy ROTC midshipmen and participated in the public forum, "Before You Take a Step: Landmine Detection and Remediation and KU's Piece of the Puzzle."

Professor Italo Trevisan, Department of Computer Sciences & Business Studies, Trento University, Italy, was invited to KU to explore a comprehensive institutional relationship between KU and Trento.

Audrey Shabbas, Founding Director of AWAIR: Arab World and Islamic Resources, visited KU in October to talk about "Unanswered Questions about Iraq."

In 2002, GSIP continued its partnership with the Greater Kansas City Chamber of Commerce World Trade Center (WTC). Maintenance of the WTC Web site (www.kctrade.com), an in-kind contribution to the WTC, gives Dean Carlin a seat on the WTC International Investors Committee.

CEA Accreditation

- The AEC staff completed a 15-month self-study for the Commission on English Language Program Accreditation, the first national agency to be formed for the sole purpose of accrediting programs that prepare non-English-speaking international students to enter the U.S. higher education system or to pursue professional goals. Elizabeth Byleen was the principal author of the AEC's self-study report.

- In December the program became the 43rd CEA fully accredited program.

Administrative Changes

- In September Christa Hansen, AEC Associate Director, left KU to become the director of the American English Institute at the University of Oregon in Eugene.
- The new associate director is Margaret Coffey, AEC Senior Language Specialist, who has been at the Center for 16 years. She has primary responsibility for AEC special programs.

Regular Students

- The AEC gave 763 English Proficiency Tests during the year to determine students' placement in our five levels of regular courses.
- Following a national post-9/11 trend, enrollment in the AEC's regular class program was down by about 14% from 2001-2002, with 252 regular students in fall, 167 in spring, and 70 in summer.

Special Programs

CIMBA

- AEC Associate Language Specialist Elizabeth Byleen went to Asolo, Italy, in September to give a three-week AEC program for non-native English speakers in KU's Italy MBA program. She continued working with a small group from the program in an on-line writing course in the spring.

Kanagawa Program

- This was the 13th year for the AEC's February English language and American culture program for Kanagawa University students. Fifteen students arrived in Lawrence in February

to begin the four-week language and culture program.

Meikai Program

- Ten students from the Economics Department of Tokyo's Meikai University during the spring semester to participate in an English language and American culture program. This new program is the brainchild of Joji Asahi, a KU alumnus who now chairs the Economics Department at Meikai.

Fulbright Pre-Academic Program

- For the fourth straight year, the AEC hosted Fulbright grantees from 24 countries to help them prepare for their graduate programs in universities across the country. The program involved 28 students from countries that are not often represented at KU: Slovakia, Swaziland, Congo, Burkina Faso, Mongolia, and Cambodia.

Special Program for Korean Executives

- Margaret Coffey signed an agreement with LG InfoComm U.S.A., a manufacturer of digital handsets based in San Diego, to teach English classes to their Korean executives in their Kansas office in Overland Park. Eada Arbab, an AEC lecturer, teaches pronunciation and fluency classes in their offices. The program runs in 5-week sessions.

ACI-Negoçia Program

- For the fifth year, the AEC ran a special 10-week program for a group of French undergraduates majoring in international business at ACI-Négoçia in France.

Visiting Professors

Fulbright Senior Scholar

- In October, Dr. Svetlana E. Kountsevitch, head of the Department of English Stylistics at Minsk State Linguistic University in Belarus, arrived to begin a four-month affiliation with KU and the AEC under the Fulbright Senior Scholar Program. Dr. Kountsevitch produced a course and textbook tentatively titled *Challenges of the Modern World: A Language Training Course for Advanced Students of English* that may be used by the Belorussian Ministry of Education for interpreters specializing in international relations.

Carnegie Research Fellow

- Svetlana Kouznetsova, professor of English at Tomsk State University, Tomsk, Russia, was placed at KU by the Carnegie Research Fellowship Program. During her four months at the AEC Kouznetsova developed professional and personal friendships with our English teachers, visited classes, audited courses in several KU departments, attended the TESOL convention and researched.

International Visitors Program

- In April twelve English language educators from Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, and Belarus visited KU as part of the State Department-funded International Visitors Program.

Staff Activities

- Four AEC staffers presented papers at the NAFSA Conference in Scottsdale, Arizona, at the end of October: Ann Tilson, Howard Pollock, Margaret Coffey, and Marcellino Berardo.
- The AEC was well represented at the TESOL Convention in Baltimore in March. Mark Algren was the chair and received praise from attendees from around the world for organizing a great convention. Vito Reardon, Elizabeth Byleen, Malika Lyon, Karen Erb, Dawn Haverkate-Ens, Chris Jensen, and Melissa Renfrow all presented papers.

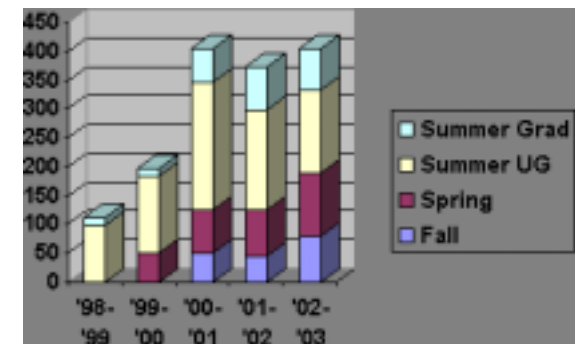

Consortium Italy Program

KU is the degree granting and coordinating institution of the Consortium of Universities for International Studies, a non-profit organization composed of 34 U.S. institutions of higher education. In the Italian city of Asolo, 333 students from more than 30 countries participated. Eleven KU faculty members were on staff.

Indigenous Nations Studies Program

With the help of Study Abroad, the Indigenous Nations Studies graduate program at the University of Kansas has developed a collaborative international exchange with the University of Oulu in Finland and the University of Newcastle in Australia called the World Indigenous Graduate Exchange Program.

Raven Aurora Naramore, the first KU student to participate in this three-way exchange program, studied at the University of Oulu in Finland during the Spring 2003 semester, working toward a master's degree. She is studying

the Saami, an indigenous peoples also known as Laplanders.

New programs

This year the Schools of Social Welfare and Journalism added two new opportunities to study abroad in San José, Costa Rica. The addition of study abroad programs in these professional schools is an important expansion of opportunities for new academic programs and a departure from the long history of language and culture courses offered abroad. The programs also expand the longstanding relationship between the University of Kansas and the University of Costa Rica.

International Social Work: A Costa Rican Perspective, San José, Costa Rica

Participants spent 12 days in Costa Rica in late May learning about Costa Rican culture and approaches to Social Work. They gained “hands on” experience in international approaches to social work through visits to agencies in the San José area, including San Juan de Dios Hospital, Centro Cultural Costa, and the Center for Research on Women’s Studies.

International Media/Marketing Communications in Costa Rica, San José, Costa Rica

During this 15-day program in late May-early June, students spent a few days on coursework at the University of Costa Rica with UCR students and faculty and took a media tour of San José that included visits to *La Nación* (one of the most important dailies in Latin America), and to advertising and public relations agencies and broadcast stations. Students also had the opportunity to visit businesses outside of San

José, including the coffee industry and the eco-tourism industry.

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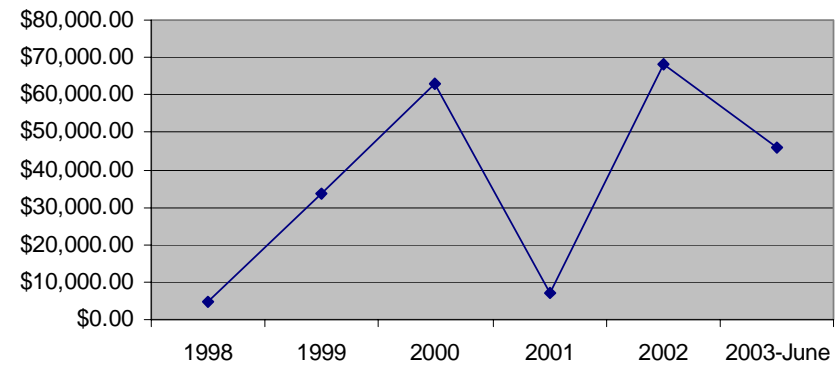
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
